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
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LEARNING AMBASSADORS



JOHN LINDSAY

John Lindsay, a 61-yearold River Ngarrindjeri man, embodies the spirit of lifelong learning and community education. Born in Barmera and raised on the Gerard Aboriginal Mission, John's upbringing was

rooted in strong cultural values and community involvement. He attended Winke Primary and Glossop High Schools and played local football. Throughout his career, John held various community roles, including grave digging, house repairs, and council jobs. His dedication extended to community-led projects like the Aboriginal Sobriety Group in the 1970s and '80s. Despite challenges such as inconsistent employment and limited literacy, John returned to education at Tauondi Aboriginal College in recent years. After completing a Skill Up Program, he is now enrolled in a Certificate I in Access to Vocational Pathways. As a respected Aboriginal mentor-leader, John supports others in their educational journeys, demonstrating his commitment to mentoring and lifelong learning. His presence in the classroom is inspiring, proving that learning and personal growth are ongoing processes. By continuing his education later in life and helping others, John demonstrates that personal transformation can happen at any age.



FARAH NAZ

Farah, 45, arrived from Pakistan in November 2013. Despite her teaching experience, her qualifications weren't recognised in Australia. So, until 2021, Farah invested her years in looking after her family

and raising her three children. On a visit to the Salvation Army, Farah was recommended to the Morella Community Centre, where she was encouraged to participate in their gatherings and activities. Farah ended up enrolling in the Pathways to Children's Services course, which she completed in December 2021. In March 2022, Farah undertook a Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and Care, before starting in 2023 as a Home Interaction Program for Parents and Youngsters (HIPPY) tutor with Novita. Currently, Farah is continuing her learning journey while working and is now pursuing a Diploma in Education Support. Her goal is to secure a position in a school as an assessment officer.



CHRISTIANA DAVIES

Christiana came to
Australia 18 years ago
as a refugee from
Sierra Leone. She has
overcome many barriers
in her learning journey,
starting with building
her foundation studies
through the Australian

Migrant English Program and adapting to the Australian education system to achieve her Bachelor of Nursing. During her studies, she faced additional challenges, such as having





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to defer her education for a year after a difficult pregnancy and moving back and forth between Adelaide and Canberra. Despite these obstacles, she managed to keep learning and is currently finishing her postgraduate degree in mental health nursing while also working in the field. Christiana was also awarded a women in leadership scholarship by the South Australian Government and is now a leader and mentor in her community, serving as the Chairperson of the African Women's Foundation for South Australia.



HAYDON GRIGG

Haydon, 28, faced challenges fitting into traditional schooling and ultimately failed Year 12 due to difficulties with reading, writing, and socialising with others. He enjoyed handson learning, but his

struggle with self-confidence led to a spiral of depression and anxiety. Haydon has overcome significant mental health challenges through Eastwood Community Centre's Adult and Community Education (ACE) programs. These classes and their support have been immensely beneficial, boosting Haydon's confidence and enabling him to live independently in his own unit. He started with a cooking program, which improved his ability to cook for himself, and he has now expanded his learning into using TikTok and podcasting.



TILLY TJALA THOMAS MUSICIAN

Tilly Tjala Thomas is a Nukunu singersongwriter, who grew up on the Fleurieu Peninsula, South of Adelaide. Since finishing school in 2020, the

electronic pop and indie musician has bagged numerous industry accolades, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Musician of the Year, NIMA Unearthed Award at the 2021 National Indigenous Music Awards and the Emily Burrows Award at the 2021 South Australian Music Awards. Tilly was awarded the Stigwood Artist Fellowship (2022) and released her first EP, Sanctuary.
