Celebrate Adult Learners Week: *Take the Journey* 1-8 September 2024

[Adult Learners Week](#) is back from 1 to 8 September 2024, inviting Australians to *Take the Journey* into adult education. This annual UNESCO event, coordinated by [Adult Learning Australia](#) and supported by the Commonwealth Government, highlights the transformative power of lifelong learning and the diverse educational pathways available to adults across the nation.

Kathleen Priestly - President of Adult Learning Australia, emphasises that "Adult Learners Week showcases the journey anyone can take through adult education, regardless of age or life stage. It's about developing skills, connecting with others and gaining the confidence to participate fully in local communities."

Adult Learners Week celebrates all forms of learning, from formal education to informal experiences. It aims to connect individuals with community education providers, fostering skills and confidence that benefit both personal wellbeing and community participation.

"Adult learning is for everyone," says Ms. Priestly, "including those hesitant about re-engaging with education. Learning can help people overcome barriers created by not being able to read or write, use technology, or speak or write English. The life transforming outcomes can range from increased work satisfaction to managing necessities like understanding medication labels and simple joys such as reading bedtime stories to your children."

The importance of adult learning is underscored by the following statistics. In Australia today

- 44% of adult Australians aged 15-74 have very low literacy skills and 54% have very low numeracy skills¹
- 9.4% of Australians remain highly digitally excluded with the digital gap notably wider between First Nations and non-First Nations people, especially in remote areas²
- At a time when the workplace requires people to be better qualified, the number of young Australians leaving school without completing year 12 is on the rise with 1 in 5 young people leaving school early.³

However, progress is being made:

- In 2023, over 1 million students were enrolled in government-funded vocational education and training⁴
- 42% of Australians aged 15-74 participated in some form of learning in 2020-21⁵
- 80% of people with non-school qualifications are employed, compared to 58% without.⁶

Adult Learners Week will feature inspiring stories* of adult learners who have transformed their lives through education. They include:

Emma Griggs – New South Wales

Emma, a proud Wiradjuri woman overcame homelessness and educational challenges to transform her life. After securing a role in the NSW Police Force, she pursued further education, earning diplomas in Counselling and Mental Health. Now 45, Emma teaches Community Services and Applied Aboriginal Studies, empowering others in her community through her own journey of resilience and determination.

Melanie Cameron – Queensland

Melanie, a 22-year-old is dedicated to self-improvement despite facing intellectual impairment. With help from her support worker, she has engaged in adult literacy classes at Kawana Library, enhancing her reading and social skills. Melanie's commitment to learning extends to volunteering, as she aims to seize more opportunities in the future.

Christiana Davies – South Australia

Christiana, a refugee from Sierra Leone, has navigated numerous barriers to achieve her educational goals in Australia. She built her foundation through the Australian Migrant English Program and is now completing her postgraduate degree in mental health nursing while working in the field. As a leader in her community, she serves as Chairperson of the African Women's Foundation for South Australia, demonstrating her commitment to mentorship.

Kerry Hume – Victoria

Kerry Hume, a 40-year-old mother of three began her farming career two years ago and has since pursued various agricultural courses. Her dedication has led to her role as Assistant Manager at Aurora Dairies and recognition in the Great South West Dairy Awards. Kerry appreciates the supportive adult learning environment, which has enhanced her skills and opened new opportunities.

Tim Royle – Western Australia

Tim, 37, has struggled with literacy due to dyslexia but has pursued improvement through a mature-age apprenticeship and work as a prison officer. After seeking help from Read Write Now, he is dedicated to enhancing his reading and writing skills to advance in his career. Tim's journey reflects

his resilience and commitment to lifelong learning and he hopes his story inspires others to do the same.

Mick Curtis – Tasmania

Mick Curtis, originally from South Australia, began his working life in abattoirs and faced challenges with literacy. At 48, he accepted an opportunity from his employer to improve his skills through classes at the Geeveston Community Centre. With support from 26Ten, Mick has made significant progress and aims to become a supervisor in the future.

These are just a few of the many inspiring stories of adults who have transformed their lives through embarking on new learning experiences.

ADULT LEARNERS WEEK - BACKGROUND

Adult Learners Week is coordinated by [Adult Learning Australia](#), the national peak body for adult and community education. It is a UNESCO initiative supported in Australia by the Commonwealth Government and run each year in the first week of September.

Hundreds of events and activities are held around Australia and online to promote the benefits of adult education and lifelong learning.

Any adult education and training organisation can get involved in Adult Learners Week including neighbourhood houses, community centres, libraries, training organisations, local governments, Aboriginal learning cooperatives, employers, not-for-profit organisations, workplaces, men's or women's sheds, U3As, community colleges, TAFE colleges and universities.

Every year, scholarships are awarded to outstanding adult learners to enable them to continue learning either by taking a new learning pathway or continue an existing one. Adult learning providers are invited to nominate adult learners who are changing the trajectory of their lives through adult learning.

1. Kerry Hume – Victoria



Kerry, a 40-year-old mother of three, is the newly appointed Assistant Manager at Aurora Dairies Glenfyne farm near Cobden. Her farming journey began two years ago when she started milking cows. Encouraged by her manager, she took an agriculture course at Rural Industry Skills Training (RIST) and hasn't looked back.

Kerry completed several Learn Local courses, including Agriculture Work Health and Safety, Ruminant Nutrition, and Introduction to Soils. She's now finishing a Certificate IV in Agriculture and already considering a Diploma.

These opportunities have opened many doors for Kerry, including winning the Employee Award in the Great South West Dairy Awards. Kerry finds adult learning more relaxed and supportive compared to her school days. She describes the adult learning environment as nurturing and flexible, enhancing her literacy and skills.

2. Haydon Grigg – South Australia



Haydon, 28, faced challenges fitting into traditional schooling and ultimately failed Year 12 due to difficulties with reading, writing, and socialising with others. He enjoyed hands-on learning, but his struggle with self-confidence led to a spiral of depression and anxiety.

Haydon has overcome significant mental health challenges through Eastwood Community Centre's Adult and Community Education (ACE) programs. These classes and their support have been immensely beneficial, boosting Haydon's confidence and enabling him to live independently in his own unit. He started with a cooking program, which improved his ability to cook for himself, and he has now expanded his learning into using TikTok and podcasting.

Despite occasional self-doubt, Haydon is remarkably articulate and is discovering his strengths while learning to maintain a positive and resilient outlook. His learning journey has brought personal growth and achievement. He is now mentoring other young people, using his TikTok skills, volunteering, and continuing with more classes to prepare for a better future.

3. Christiana Davies – South Australia



Christiana came to Australia 18 years ago as a refugee from Sierra Leone. She has overcome many barriers in her learning journey, starting with building her foundation studies through the Australian Migrant English Program and adapting to the Australian education system to achieve her Bachelor of Nursing.

During her studies, she faced additional challenges, such as having to defer her education for a year after a difficult pregnancy and moving back and forth between Adelaide and Canberra. Despite these obstacles, she managed to keep learning and is currently finishing her postgraduate degree in mental health nursing while also working in the field.

Christiana was also awarded a women in leadership scholarship by the South Australian Government and is now a leader and mentor in her community, serving as the Chairperson of the African Women's Foundation for South Australia.

4. John Lindsay – South Australia



John Lindsay, a 61-year-old River Ngarrindjeri man, embodies the spirit of lifelong learning and community education. Born in Barmera and raised on the Gerard Aboriginal Mission, John's upbringing was rooted in strong cultural values and community involvement. He attended Winke Primary and Glossop High Schools and played local football. Throughout his career, John held various community roles, including grave digging, house repairs, and council jobs. His dedication extended to community-led projects like the Aboriginal Sobriety Group in the 1970s and '80s.

Despite challenges such as inconsistent employment and limited literacy, John returned to education at Tauondi Aboriginal College in recent years. After completing a Skill Up Program, he is now enrolled in a Certificate I in Access to Vocational Pathways. As a respected Aboriginal mentor-leader, John supports others in their educational journeys, demonstrating his commitment to mentoring and lifelong learning. His presence in the classroom is inspiring, proving that learning and personal growth are ongoing processes.

By continuing his education later in life and helping others, John demonstrates that personal transformation can happen at any age.

5. Farah Naz – South Australia



Farah, 45, arrived from Pakistan in November 2013. Despite her teaching experience, her qualifications weren't recognised in Australia. So, until 2021, Farah invested her years in looking after her family and raising her three children.

On a visit to the Salvation Army, Farah was recommended to the Morella Community Centre, where she was encouraged to participate in their gatherings and activities. Farah ended up enrolling in the Pathways to Children's Services course, which she completed in December 2021.

In March 2022, Farah undertook a Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and Care, before starting in 2023 as a Home Interaction Program for Parents and Youngsters (HIPPY) tutor with Novita. Currently, Farah is continuing her learning journey while working and is now pursuing a Diploma in Education Support. Her goal is to secure a position in a school as an assessment officer.

6. Mick Curtis – Tasmania



Mick, originally from South Australia, began his working life in the abattoirs in Port Pirie. He struggled to complete Year 12, barely able to spell his own name. When he moved to Tasmania to work for Mitchell Plastic Welding, a small family-run business, the manager noticed Mick found reading and writing challenging. The manager asked if Mick wanted to improve his skills and, at 48, Mick happily accepted the challenge.

Supported by 26Ten, a network of organisations and individuals working together to improve adult literacy and numeracy in Tasmania, Mick started classes at the local community centre (Geeveston Community Centre) in 2022. His employer even pays for his time at the classes. In late 2022, Mick won Employee of the Month. He aims to improve his reading and writing skills further so that one day he can become a supervisor.

7. Tim Royle – Western Australia



Tim, aged 37, has struggled with reading, writing, and spelling for most of his life. After being diagnosed with dyslexia in primary school, Tim found high school to be incredibly difficult. He decided to leave in year 9 and he worked various jobs before starting a mature-age apprenticeship as a roof plumber at 23.

After 13 years in the roof plumbing industry, including running his own business, Tim switched careers and joined the Department of Justice as a prison officer. However, his difficulties with reading and writing posed increasing challenges to his role. In 2019, he sought help from Read Write Now in WA to improve his

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understanding of workplace documents and report writing, which are crucial for his job.

Tim continues to work with Read Write Now to better his literacy knowledge, hoping for a more challenging role at his work pace. Tim remains dedicated to learning and hopes his story inspires others to embark on their own learning journeys.

8. Melanie Cameron – Queensland



Melanie is a 22-year-old woman who continually strives to improve herself through learning, despite her intellectual impairment and disadvantaged background.

With the help of her support worker, Melanie has connected with the Kawana Library on the Sunshine Coast where she has taken up regular adult literacy classes. During this time, she has improved her reading, writing, and spelling, as well as built her social skills and self-confidence.

Melanie also volunteers and is determined to keep learning and improving herself so she can take on more opportunities in the future.

9. Emma Griggs – NSW



Emma is a proud Wiradjuri Woman. Her journey has been a rollercoaster of challenges and triumphs. Growing up on Gadigal/Bidjigal Land, descending from a tiny town in central western NSW, her family's story was deeply affected by the Stolen Generation. This brought trauma to Emma's family, impacting generations. By 14, she was homeless and out of school. However, by 21, Emma was determined to change her path, reconnect with her family, and begin rebuilding her life.

With little education beyond Year 9, Emma was fortunate to secure an administration role in the NSW Police Force, where she found support and mentorship. She completed a secretarial course and later moved to work for NSW Ambulance. There, management encouraged her to pursue further education, leading to diplomas in Counselling, and Certificate IVs in both Mental Health, and Alcohol and Other Drugs.

Now 45, Emma teaches Community Services at TAFE and Applied Aboriginal Studies at Tranby Aboriginal Cooperative and is currently training to be an Adult Literacy Numeracy teacher. Her journey from hardship to education has filled her life with purpose, allowing her to mentor and empower others in her community.

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10. Ornina Ekhtiar



Ornina was born in Syria, where she completed high school and a pathology course. However, about 10 years ago, due to civil unrest, she and her family fled to Lebanon as refugees. With her education interrupted, she couldn't continue her studies.

When Ornina and her family were granted refugee status and came to Australia, she was determined to learn English. She successfully completed a Certificate I in Language at TAFE. Despite recovering from a hand injury that caused her some difficulties, she remained committed to her education.

Ornina is now working towards her Certificate II in Workplace Skills at MTC Australia, an adult education provider in Sydney. She is also gaining work experience with the Assyrian Resource Centre in Fairfield, thanks to a collaboration between MTC Australia and the Resource Centre.

Her dream is to resume her studies in pathology so she can work in hospitals. Ornina believes that improving English language skills can open many opportunities for young women like her, and she encourages others to do the same.

Also on Monday is an age pension income support program, from 1pm to 2pm, at the Westvale Community Centre in Kings Park, and a bibliotherapy for wellbeing session at the Deer Park Library, from 2pm to 3pm, giving adults the opportunity to learn about the therapeutic effect of reading stories and poems.

The weekend is full of action too, headlined by a painting class at the St Albans Library on Saturday, September 7, from 2pm to 3pm. Aboriginal artist, Aimee McCartney, will teach how to paint artwork using her unique, intricate, and eye-catching style.

Brimbank deputy mayor Jae Papalia said Adult Learners Week has opportunities for everyone to learn something new.

"Adult Learners Week is a great opportunity to explore your interests and maybe learn a new skill. The program has been carefully curated so that there's plenty on offer. What you learn, you get to take home and hopefully that sparks further interest and learning," she said.

Scottsdale Library adult literacy support offering

GATH KILNER has returned to Scottsdale Library in a new role supporting adult literacy in the North-East.

Ms Kilner views the library as a unique place to connect and facilitate collaboration with the local community.

After volunteering with children's after school programs such as Code Club, she became interested in education and retrained as a teacher – a career which opened her eyes to many challenges learners face, including dyslexia.

"My experience is that people I have met with dyslexia are often highly creative and good at finding strategies to cope, especially with assistive technologies at our fingertips. Teaching has helped me understand how everyone learns differently and I'm excited to be able to offer tailored learning programs to suit people's goals," she said.

Libraries Tasmania offers free one-to-one help for adults in the North-East who would like to improve their reading, writing or everyday maths skills.

This may include help with applying for a job or enrolling in a course, preparing for a learner licence test, reading to your children and or learning spelling tips.

The library is celebrating Adult Learners Week with a Dorset History Talk at 11am on Wednesday, September 4 and Beginners Ukulele from 10.30 am – 12 noon on Friday, September 6.

The unretiring type

MEET THE OLDER AUSTRALIANS PURSUING THEIR PASSION FOR LEARNING

Vernon Hughes's villa looks like any other in Bolton Clarke Daycrest Retirement Village, a lush, sub-tropical community in Queensland's Hervey Bay. But to step inside is to enter a scientific wonderland. Hughes's home laboratory occupies what was once a second bedroom: a clutch of microscopes, a lifetime of detailed field notes, and hundreds – if not thousands – of copepods, little-known marine crustaceans that grow no larger than two millimetres. The discovery is not surprising, given Hughes is the world's leading expert on the multicoloured, microscopic marine crustaceans. The intrepid explorer has travelled the world in his quest for aquatic understanding, discovering 43 new copepod species across Australia, Japan and Scotland.

"I've spent 37 years studying them and I'm still doing my research - I've never retired," Hughes, 98, says.

The globally respected zoologist continues to advance scientific knowledge of the tiny translucent invertebrates by meticulously examining, illustrating and recording copepod colonies from his home lab.

His research is published in international academic journals, his specimens are studied

for more women to undertake tertiary education. She took the advice to heart.
 Her eventual career as a teacher librarian set the foundation for a retirement dedicated to learning: how to fight fires, how to play billiards, how to sketch, how to write a novel, and how to handle fossils.
 Gibbs feeds off the energy and enthusiasm of people around her to approach ageing with positivity and passion.
 Her palaeontologist granddaughter inspired her to volunteer in the palaeontology department at Flinders University, learning about the world's layered history, while the 12 years she spent tutoring at the University of Adelaide's Wirru Yarku Aboriginal Education exposed her to Indigenous culture and history.
 The published author is always sharpening her storytelling skills; completing a Master of Creative Writing, contributing to literary journals, tossing around ideas in an online writers group and teaching herself how to sketch. She is also a 15-year veteran of the Country Fire Service, a three-time Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race participant, a self-taught billiards player, and a fledgling knitter learning the craft under the watchful eye of her 100-year-old tutor.
 "There's always a new thing to learn. Always," Gibbs says. "Learning is a constant passion and keeping your brain going is one of the most crucial things you can do as you age."
 In agreement is Professor Judy Lowthian, the head of research and principal research fellow at the Bolton Clarke Research Institute.

The industry-leading institute prioritises research and innovation that underpins positive ageing and supports other Australians to lead fuller, more satisfying lives.
 The Institute practices what it preaches, engaging older people in its research through consumer advisory groups and as pilot program participants.
 "We know that keeping the mind active is one of the core ways to help reduce, reverse or postpone symptoms of frailty," Prof. Lowthian says.
 "Lifelong learning with others has a dual benefit; it provides the opportunity to foster social and community connections and improve quality of life, because a strong social network and meaningful social interactions improve wellbeing and even protect against cognitive decline.
 "Also, passing on the skills or knowledge that you have to others brings a real sense of purpose and belonging. For example, we run intergenerational storytelling programs where everyone plays an active role."
 Adult Learners Week runs September 1-8, with a focus on encouraging people to keep learning at every age and stage.



So I read it through and I was thinking, well, I can do that because I am really people, orientated People do come to me for, various things or whatever. And then I started searching if there is any cuddle therapist course and obviously in Australia there wasn't any in those days. Um, so I found one that was based in UK. Um cuddles, professionals international. I did a course. They gave me just basic knowledge about the cuddle therapy and those things. Um, which I didn't feel it was enough. So then I did a masters course just to learn more about the bodies, the skin and everything, and that set me off. So yeah, that was my beginning. Plenty of Australians made it through to finals through the morning session, the best of which Jake Marshall cut through in first place in his heat in the 100m breaststroke Sb14 competition, he is the fastest qualifier for the final. Elsewhere in the women's 100 metre breaststroke sb14 category, Page Lennard third fastest into the final.

Unfortunately, Ruby Storm missed out. Ahmed Kelly made it through in eighth place into the final of the 50m backstroke, while Chloe Osborne and Hollie Warn will also be through to the final. In the women's 400m freestyle S7 category, Osborne was third fastest and Hollie Warn was seventh fastest there in the Athletics. In the final of the men's 100m T34 class, Rheed McCracken finished in fourth place, couldn't quite overcome a poor start and just missed out on the bronze medal. Whilst Madison de Rozario is safely through to tomorrow morning's final. Of the 1500 metres in the T54 category. There are more medals in the offing tonight. There are more triathlon races underway at the moment. There's also wheelchair rugby. Australia plays Great Britain for the bronze medal and going for gold. 

This is the joy of adult learning. You can choose subjects you like. You can learn them in a much more friendly and informal fashion. And our libraries have got it going on for Adult Learners Week. And we've been seeing with our divide across the state that, um, with all the surveys that have been going out, checking in to see how people are improving, that we're it's showing improvement, but it's only showing those people that have the access and the skills already and unfortunately for those people from lower socioeconomic areas, there were people over the age of 75. They're not on the online to take the surveys. And so the people that need the biggest digital skill help aren't getting included, and they're getting missed out as we go along. And unfortunately, the world is going more towards online and people are getting further and further behind.

Now, how do your adult learning sessions run in a way that helps adults to learn? Because it's not necessarily the same way that we learned as kids, is it?

That's right. Well, they say you can't teach an old dog new tricks, but it's absolutely the opposite because the percentage has shown out that over 75% of adults learn purely from other adults online or face to face. And that's because, um, unlike school, where you have subjects that you

David, tell us about your story as an adult learner. Well, uh, I did my secondary schooling in Victoria at, uh, Northcote High School and Preston Marist Brothers, but I wasn't a very good student. I must admit, I didn't attend school as regularly as I should anyway. Besides that, I then finished up going to Tasmania and I started to work, worked as a union official for 12 years, and then I took a job in industrial relations with LPM in their forest products division, and I was lucky, I had a really good boss, and he was conscious that I didn't have any sort of formal education or, um, qualifications. And he encouraged me to enrol in a labor studies course in the University of Adelaide. And you started off as a diploma course. And depending on how you went with that, you were then either invited to or not invited to complete a degree course, which I completed the degree course in 1998. Congratulations, Len. I just found it one. was all done via, uh, written assignments Um, there was one, uh, seminar we went to at the university, but, um, that was the only time you ever got any real face to face time with any of the lecturers. It was all so I just I was one of those things. You just had to lock yourself away at night time and do the assignments. And once I got through that diploma course, I found it relatively easy then to complete the degree course. So and what difference does it make to your life then having that degree behind you? Well, apart from just the personal satisfaction that then enabled me to open up some, um, employment opportunities within the company to progress and finish up, I was the manager of workplace health and safety for. North Forest Products, and, um, yeah, I'd had a long industrial relations background and that's terrific. And I love that you've acknowledged your boss, because I'd imagine it's you need that support. You need that catalyst to encourage you to take that path. It sounds like it made a world of difference for you, Lynn, and I don't think he'd be embarrassed if I mentioned his name on the air if he ever hears. Well, I think lifelong learning is very, very important.

I went out to the university and I said, wandering around, the lady said, what are you doing here? And I said, oh, I don't know. I find something. Well, she said, would you like to join the Masters summer school? And so after a couple of years I had a couple of masters. Then my second I had a master's degree, you see, and the professor said, do you want to do your doctorate journey? And I said, yes, that would be nice. Thanks. So that's why it happened. So after ten years of retiring, I ended up with a PhD and, you know, things like that ten years after retiring.

But at a time when the workplace wants better qualified people, the number of young Australians leaving school without completing year 12 is on the rise. We know it's the horrendous numbers actually in Tasmania with primary and secondary schools actually, in terms of attendance rate, the second worst in the country behind the Northern Territory. Let's chat to Kathleen Priestley, president of adult learning Australia. How are you doing? Yeah.

Good. Thanks.

Did you love June?

Oh isn't June amazing? I hope I'm like June 1st day I know.

And she just keeps going. She's still learning. Now we know that in Tasmania the retention rate to year 11 and 12 is really low. So what story do the stats tell overall? Kathleen.

So yes like you referred to, we know that um, in Tasmania in particular, young people are leaving school much earlier than they should be. They're not completing year 12. Um, and we also know that this means that later on in life, they're going to need to re-engage with learning in some way to keep their skills current and to increase their skills.

We heard from June there, who at almost 92 is a lifelong learner. What do you think are the benefits before we get to mustering up the courage, I guess, to go back to learning.

So the benefits for learning at any age, but in particular as an adult, are around health and wellbeing. And so we know that when you learn as an adult, you also get benefits with social connections in your community. You're not so isolated. Depending on what you're doing, you might be contributing to actual the health of your community and it keeps your mind active as well.

What about those hesitant at re-engaging with education? You know, a lot of people say after, you know, year ten, 12, university or whatever, that's it. Done, dusted over. Yeah.

So adult learning is a very different type of learning to what you experienced at school. It's generally driven by a passion or an interest or a need that you need to upskill to stay in your job. Or you might want to learn about gardening or cooking, or you might want to learn an instrument that you've had a passion to learn all your life. And so coming to learning in a different way as an adult hopefully helps to break down some of those barriers that you've experienced. And also learning as an adult happens in many different places and locations. So it might be a library, it might be a neighbourhood house, it might be a community garden. It could be a walk through the local bush with someone who's pointing out, you know, bush foods, animals, all of those sorts of things.

What about something as simple as learning to crochet or knit?

Yes. So we have a number of places around Tasmania. If you have a look at libraries, Tasmania, lots of them have crochet knitting type clubs or classes that you can get involved with.

But now, like World Report, I'll jump and do it or do paperwork and so.

how has that transformed your life? Obviously it's helped with your work, but your life overall and opportunities generally amazing.

Um, I've got twin girls, so I've got five kids all up, I've got twin girls. Ella is dyslexic and autism and I noticed hers. She was doing things wrong and I can actually help her do her homework or my kids do their homework. Now, the first day that I did it, actually bought put like, um, tears to my wife's eyes. Oh, I can actually do it.

Mick, that is so lovely. And how supportive sounds like your family have been. But you know let's give a shout out to your employer, Mitchell. Plastic welding.

Oh, yeah. Without them, I wouldn't be anywhere. I wouldn't be here today like in Tassie today.

They gave me a job straight away when I was in need of one when I moved here.

So your message to those that see themselves in, Mick Curtis what would it be.

Oh never be afraid to ask for help. Never be afraid to put yourself out there and try and go for it.

So well thank you. I really appreciate you sharing your story and good on you for being brave enough to say, yep, need a bit of help. And you know, now you're helping your kids with their homework.

Bega Valley Shire Library will celebrate the Here 2 Help service during Adult Learners Week with a free afternoon tea at Bega Library between 3 pm and 5 pm on Thursday, 5 September.

"Here 2 Help is a literacy and numeracy support service that started at the Bega Library in May 2022 as a collaboration between TAFE NSW and the library," Library Services Coordinator, Yvette Parker said.

"Volunteer tutors provide one-on-one tuition sessions at this drop-in service, working to reach an identified goal. There is no enrolment or assessments, just education in whatever the client needs.

"Here 2 Help tutors have helped people pass driver knowledge and citizenship tests, understand workplace and government documents and improve mathematical skills.

"They have assisted people to understand vocational course materials and helped people to learn how to use assistive technology for literacy skills.

"We have many people learning English as a second language in the shire and we recently opened another Here 2 Help hub at Tura Marrang Library, which operates on Wednesday afternoons from 3pm to 4.30pm."

Former course graduates, Svitlana and Pinit are prime examples of how improved English language, literacy and numeracy can lead to further training and employment.

When Svitlana moved to Merimbula from the Ukraine, she was quick to enrol in English language courses at TAFE NSW Bega. She bolstered her formal training with the Here 2 Help program and now hopes to restart her previous career in hairdressing and gain new skills in beauty therapy.

By combining English language courses with the Here 2 Help program, Pinit was able to enrol in a Certificate III in Individual Support Disability and started her own business supporting clients.

"Here 2 Help is a vital and popular service, helping people from all backgrounds in the Bega Valley with their learning needs," Ms Parker said.

"We invite the broader community to come along to our afternoon tea and help us celebrate the dedicated volunteers making such a difference in our community and the generous work of the organisation.

"It's also an opportunity for people who might need to use the service to find out more about it by chatting with the tutors and clients about their journey in learning."

 New laws have come into play to give workers the right to ignore after hour calls and emails. The right to disconnect is intended to restore boundaries between employers and employees Australia is the latest country to implement laws giving people the right to disconnect from their employer and workplace. Mental health experts say it's a positive step for workers.
 Well, it will create a good work-life balance and it's giving employees permission to be able to disconnect, to be able to switch off, and that work is within their designated time frame.
 Your right to disconnect will depend on how reasonable after hours contact may be. You will have to raise a direct complaint with your employer if you think your right is being impinged on. But lawyers say what is and isn't reasonable will be a point of contention, because what's reasonable for one person is certainly unreasonable for the other. And we don't have any case law on this point to govern or act as precedent when we determine such matters after a direct complaint is made. The Fair Work Commission will get involved by offering dispute resolution methods such as mediation. If that doesn't work, stop orders will be issued. The Fair Work Commission can hand out civil penalties. Miss Hoffman says this marks a change in workplace culture.

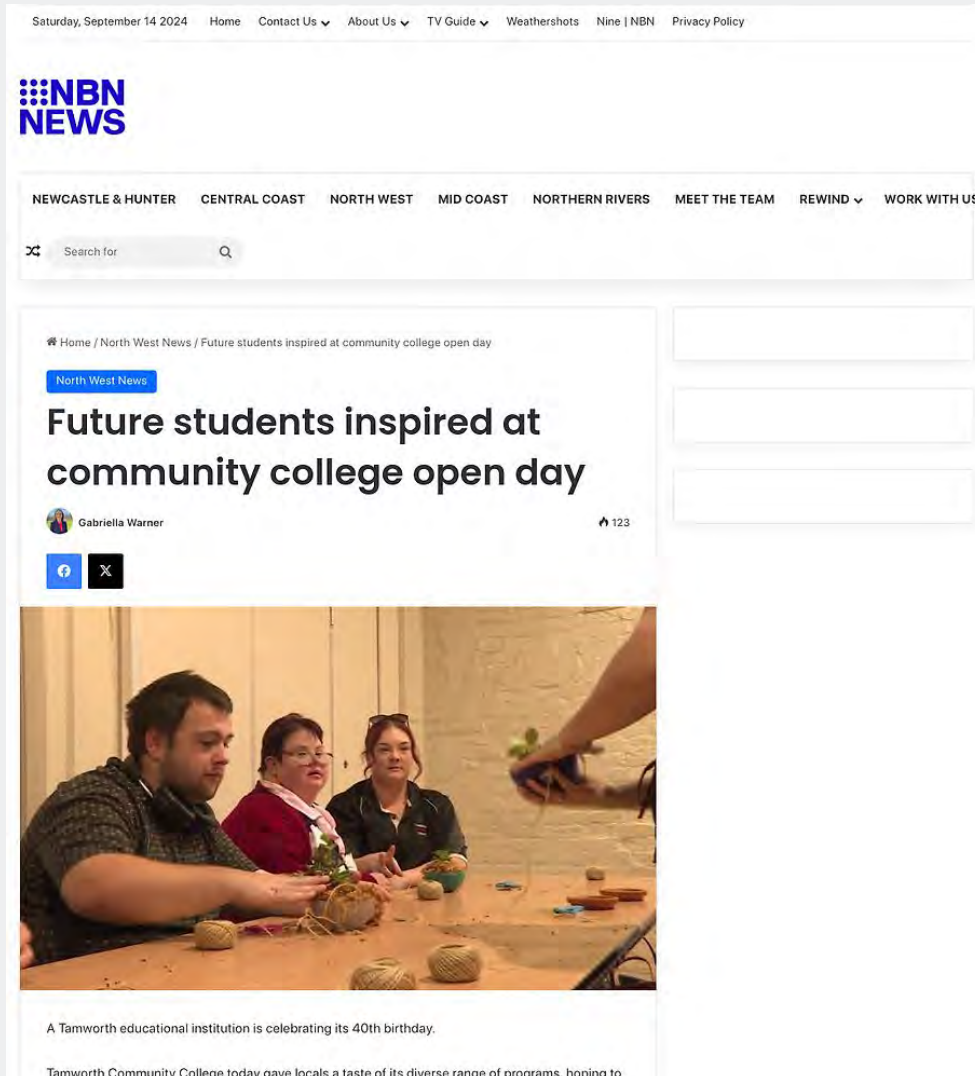
